- Change your voice to fit the mood or action.


 This helps children hear fluent reading with proper expression and intonation.
- For younger children, move your finger under the words as you read.

 This helps students to learn to track the print and that the words match the print.

 Sometimes older children need to use a bookmark to help them track print.
- Allow children to ask questions or make comments.

 This helps them to understand what they are reading.
- Share your own thoughts about the story as you read.
